



Synchronic Corpus

In linguistics, *synchrony* (as opposed to diachrony) refers to the analysis of language at one given point in time, usually the present, without taking its history or development into account. *Thus, a synchronic corpus provides data from one point in time.*

The International Corpus of English

- The ICE corpus consists of a collection of twenty corpora of one million words each, each composed of written and spoken English.
- All ICE corpora contain 500 texts of approximately 2,000 words each.
- Some corpora can be downloaded.

The Longman/Lancaster Corpus

- It is 30 million words of written language taken from literature, magazines, papers and more ephemeral materials such as leaflets and packaging.
- Both imaginative and informative text categories are included.
- The corpus is not available for public access.

The Longman Written American Corpus

- 100 million words comprising running text from newspapers, journals, magazines, best-selling novels, technical and scientific writing, and coffeetable books.
- Words can be concordanced, wordlists created, and statistical features analysed, allowing lexicographers to compare and contrast usage in British and American English.
- This corpus does not appear to allow public access.

The CREA corpus of Spanish

- The corpus currently contains 133 million words sampled from a wide range of written (90%) and spoken (10%) text categories.
- The corpus is accessible on the Internet.



The LIVAC corpus of Chinese

• By 2020, 2.7 billion characters of news media texts have been filtered so far, of which 680 million characters have been processed and analyzed and have yielded an expanding Pan-Chinese dictionary of 2.3 million words from the Pan-Chinese printed media.
